Standing up for Social Security: Protecting Social Security and Medicare was a major theme at the 45th PCPA convention. ILWU pensioners have been active in the fight to protect these important retirement programs so workers will be able to retire with dignity.

Fight to protect Social Security, Medicare at the forefront of pensioners' **45th PCPA Convention**

he ILWU's Pacific Coast Pensioners have been organizing to fight the attempts to cut Social Security and Medicare benefits for many years. They have been sounding the alarm, organizing demonstrations, and lobbying politicians in Washington to preserve the right of working men and women to retire with dignity after a lifetime of labor.

Protecting these important retirement benefits for all workers was a major theme at the 45th Pacific Coast Pensioners Association (PCPA) Convention that was held in San Pedro, CA on September 10-12. The threats to Social Security and Medicare are real, regardless of the outcome of the November elections. These programs will be particularly vulnerable during the "lame duck" session of Congress—the period between the November election and the time the successors take office in the New Year. This is because of the compromise deficit reduction agreement reached in 2011 that will take effect next year. In addition to eliminating the Bush-era tax cuts on the wealthy, the budget agreement would also trigger deep, automatic spending cuts in 2013 to over 1,000 essential Federal programs unless a new compromise can be reached.

Both parties targeting retirement benefits

This year's featured speaker was Dean Baker, an economist, author and co-founder of the progressive Center for Economic and Policy Research. Baker talked about the very real threats posed to Social Security and Medicare regardless of who is elected in November.

"The Republicans want to replace Medicare with a voucher program.

They'll give you a check every year to buy whatever health care you want. That will not be enough to buy what we know today as Medicare," Baker said, and seniors would have to make up the difference out of their pockets or see a reduction in benefits. He cited the past failures to introduce "free market" mechanisms into the Medicare program, most recently in the "Medicare+Choice" program in the 1990s, saying it failed because it was too expensive. "The administrative costs [in the private insurance market] are 15-20% of what is paid out in benefits each year. For Medicare it is 1.5 to 2%. How many times are we going to keep doing the experiment? It doesn't work."

Even if President Obama wins re-election, Medicare and Social Security are at risk, Baker said. He cited Obama's willingness to put Social Security and Medicare cuts on

ILWU Int'l President serves one day in jail for **EGT-related protest**

LWU International President Robert McEllrath was convicted Friday, October 28, of a misdemeanor offense in Longview, WA for "obstructing a train." He was sentenced to one day in jail and a \$500 fine.

"Fighting for good jobs in America shouldn't be a crime," said McEllrath immediately following his arrest. Before sentencing, McEllrath told the court he had "no regrets about leading men and women against corporate greed and helping

them fight to protect middle class jobs in America."

The three-day jury trial in Cowlitz County Court centered on a peaceful protest that took place in Longview Washington on September 7, 2011, when union members and supporters gathered to protest a train carrying grain destined for the EGT grain terminal at the Port of Longview because EGT was refusing to honor ILWU jurisdiction. Several months after the protest, the company agreed to settle the dispute and signed a contract with the ILWU in early February.

the table in 2011 in the attempt to reach a "grand bargain" with Republicans to reduce the deficit. Baker said the most likely way that politicians in Washington will cut Social Security benefits will be by changing the cost of living adjustment formula.

"The formula they want to use," Baker said, "would cut benefits by .3% for seniors per year. That doesn't sound like a lot of money but the point is it is cumulative. After 10 years that's a 3% reduction in your Social Security benefits. After 20 years it's a 6% reduction. That's a lot of money to seniors who are just scraping by. Lawmakers won't talk about cutting—instead they will say they are tweaking the cost of living adjustment. When they say thatthey are talking about cutting. That's real money out of people's pockets."

He also noted that the cost of living for seniors increased at a greater rate than the rest of the population because they spend a greater portion of their budget on health care which has a very high rate of inflation. They would face cuts to their income, while their cost of living continues to increase.

Protecting Social Security and Medicare was also addressed by

Gary Passmore of the California Congress of Seniors and Tom Rankin of the California Alliance for Retired Americans—activist groups that have been at the forefront of the political battle to protect retirement benefits of retired Americans.

Mike Marino, President of the Vancouver Pensioners, gave a report on Canada's health care system. He noted that virtually everyone in Canada is covered by that nation's Medicare program, yet patient costs are far below what they are in the U.S. He warned that the same forces attempting to privatize Medicare in the U.S. are also at work in Canada, but said Canadians will furiously fight any attempts at privatization.

New PCPA Local chartered

PCPA President Rich Austin presented a charter to the newest pensioner club the Local 46 Gold Coast Pensioners club in Port Hueneme, CA. Rudy Mendez and Steve Garcia accepted the charter on behalf of the new chapter.

Active members and ILWU officials have long supported the work of the PCPA. This year was no exception. International President Bob McEllrath, Vice-President Ray Familathe, Vice-President Wesley Furtado, Secretary-Treasurer Willie Adams, Coast Committeemen Ray

Ortiz, and Local Presidents Joe Cortez (13), Mike Podue (63), Danny Miranda (94), Jeff Smith (8) Pete McEllrath (92) also attended the convention.

Vice President Ray Familathe and Secretary Treasurer Willie Adams addressed the convention on the first day. Familathe recognized the important contributions that pensioners play in ILWU organizing efforts and contract fights. He said the impact of the pensioner's activism was an important part in getting Rite Aid to agree to a contract with the 500 members of Local 26 working at the Lancaster, CA distribution warehouse.

Secretary-Treasurer Adams outlined many of the political challenges facing the ILWU in the November elections including the anti-union, Proposition 32 in California and the fact that so many politicians on both sides of the aisle lack the courage and backbone to stand up for workers. "Nobody is going to fight for us but us," Adams said. "We have to be prepared to fight for ourselves and we can't depend on one man or one woman in elected office to make a difference for us."

Former ILWU President Dave Arian, who currently serves on the Los Angeles Port Commission, spoke about the future of automation. Local 13 member and Long Beach Port Commissioner Rich Dines spoke about the plans for future growth and infrastructure modernization in the Port of Long Beach.

Other speakers included Connor Casey, labor archivist for the University of Washington's Harry Bridges Center for Labor Studies, CA State Senator Alan Lowenthal, who is a candidate for California's 47th Congressional District and California Assembly member Bonnie Lowenthal. John Castanho, ILWU Benefits Specialist and the local area benefits specialists also spoke.

Jesse and Lois Stranahan Award

Each Convention gives the Jesse and Lois Stranahan Award to an outstanding labor person. This year two awards were presented. One was presented to Lou Loveridge of the Southern California Pensioners Group, and the other was presented posthumously to Al Perisho, also from the Southern California Pensioners who recently passed.

The convention was a great success this year and the work is already underway for next year's convention that will be held in Portland, OR from September 16 - 18.

embers of ILWU Local 63 and pensioners a longtime leader on August 29 when Al Perisho passed at the age of 81 surrounded by his family at his Los Alamitos home.

Al Perisho was born on September 9, 1931, in Long Beach, California. He graduated from Banning High School in 1949 and became an Eagle Scout before shipping out with the Marines to serve in Korea. He returned to Long Beach and was working at an Army dock in 1953 when he met Myrtle Van Meter, the love of his life with whom he spent the next 59 years. Co-workers at the dock office took up a collection to help the new couple and the \$15 they raised was enough for a Las Vegas wedding and honeymoon.

Perisho's longshore career began in 1954 and continued for the next four decades. He quickly won local leadership elections and was recognized by Harry Bridges as a young man with talent.

"Harry would stay with us at our home when he came down here, and he invited us to stay with them in Hawaii.


Those experiences had a big impact on everyone in our family," said Myrt Perisho, who noted that their children remain strong union supporters. The eldest son, Terry Perisho, is a pilot for American Airlines who is active in his union that's fighting corporate greed and opposing a bankruptcy scheme designed to break the unions.

Perisho was elected by Local 63 members to serve four terms as President and 2 ½ terms as Secretary-Treasurer. In 1976, Perisho took a 6-year leave of absence from the union to accept an appointment as mediator for the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service.

After retiring in 1994, Perisho continued his union activity and lived by the Pensioner's creed: "retired from the job but not from the union!" Perisho was elected to leadership positions by his fellow Pensioners and served as President of the Southern California Pensioners Group. During his retired years, Perisho enjoyed meeting with young people and teaching them about unions. He accepted many invitations to lecture to high school and college classes about labor history and his experience working on the waterfront.

A service was held at the Longshoremen's Memorial Hall in Wilmington on September 20th to celebrate Al Perisho's life and his many contributions to the union. Local 13's Victor Hudak presided at the affair, welcoming the family and friends who gathered, then turned to ILWU International Secretary-Treasurer Willie Adams who provided the eulogy along with condolences and regards from the International officers - and encouragement for everyone present to celebrate Perisho's life and follow his example of leadership. Adams smiled as he told a story about first meeting Perisho twenty years ago on a trip with ILWU members to Cuba. "Several years later," explained Adams, "Al tried to talk me out of running for International office, but I decided to go ahead, and we both maintained our respect and friendship. He loved the ILWU and was passionate about the Southern California pensioners," said Adams.

Testimonials followed from longtime friend Manny Ortega, poet and co-worker Jerry Brady, Southern California Pensioner President Penne Lavery, Auxiliary #8 President Ida Taylor, Local 63 President Mike Podue, and former Local 94 President George



Gilbert. Teamster official Patrick Kelly offered his respects, noting that Perisho always made an effort to work with other unions, despite occasional conflicts between the ILWU, Teamsters and other unions. The memorial service closed with a poignant slide show that revealed how much time and effort Perisho devoted to raising his family, fishing and backpacking in the High Sierras, and donating his "extra" time to the Red Cross and other worthy causes - in addition to his devotion the ILWU. His many community contributions earned him "Man of the Year" awards from the City of Los Alamitos, the Los Angeles/ Long Beach Harbor and the Southern California Pensioners Group.

Perisho is survived by his wife Myrt; daughter Cheri Phillips, sons Terry and Jack Perisho, grandchildren Shaun, Christy, Jake, Jacquie and his brother Tom Harvey.

John Waddell, former Puget Sound & Washington **Area Welfare Director**




ohn Waddell passed away on June 20. John was known as a dedicated unionist who did an exemplary job as the Area Welfare Director for the Puget Sound and Washington State. John was registered in Local 32 in the Port of Everett, Washington in 1963. During his career he was elected by the membership to serve as business agent, executive board member, and on the labor relations committee.

In 1981 he was appointed to serve as the Puget Sound and Washington Area Welfare Director, a post he held for 16 years. John was credited by many as being instrumental in helping to secure maintenance of benefits for the ILWU's health and welfare plan.

"John was a good union man. He was a guy you definitely wanted to have during negotiations," said Ron Costa from Local 63.

"It's because of people like John who have fought for our maintenance of benefits for our health and welfare plan that we have what we have today," said International President Bob McEllrath. "

"John Waddell trained many of us in the benefits area," said Tony Sogliuzzo, former Southern California Area Welfare Director. I'll always cherish his passion for the most needy of our union family—the retired, the widowed, the disabled and all others who cannot help themselves."



Changing the guard: ILA International Vice President Ken Riley celebrated his new post as President of South Carolina's AFL-CIO on September 8. He was joined by ILWU International Secretary-Treasurer Willie Adams who attended the event to honor outgoing President Donna DeWitt - and thank Riley for his long record of solidarity with ILWU causes, including a visit last Fall to Longview, WA when International President McEllrath first faced charges connected to the EGT struggle for good jobs and ILWU jurisdiction.

Riley joined the ILA in 1977; twenty years later he was elected President of ILA Local 1422 in Charleston. He gained acclaim for his leadership of a global campaign to support the ILA's "Charleston Five" who were arrested in 2000 after a protest for good jobs where scores of ILA members were beaten by law enforcement. After enduring a year of house arrest, the Charleston Five were finally freed with help from the ILWU and unions around the world. ILA President Harold Daggett sent a message of congratulations that saluted Riley as "a tested labor warrior." Willie Adams called Riley a "working class hero with strong roots in the community and the right vision to help workers fight for justice in South Carolina."
